LINK Project Proposal

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In our junior year, students of Animas High School are expected to complete a three week internship program with an organization of our choice in order to gather experience from the real world and then apply it to our lives both inside and outside of school. This program will help us to learn how to deal with real work and prepare us for real-world problems. It will be a useful addition to our college resumes as it shows that we have this experience. It does not have to be situated in Durango, and can in fact be located anywhere in the world. For my internship I will be working at the Durango Public Library with Sandy Irwin as my primary mentor and with other librarians guiding me through various areas of the library experience.

The Durango Public Library is a local organization situated along the Animas River, and the mission of this organization is to offer broad and relevant connections, public programming, current technology, and excellent service in a welcoming environment. This is a mission that they strive to achieve and their efforts show in the very atmosphere of the building. The library is a strong and necessary addition to our community known for its contribution to the cultural and intellectual quality of Durango as well as a safe place of gathering for Durango's teenage population.

My primary mentor will be Sandy Irwin, who is the assistant director to the library. Along with her, I also know I'll be working with Abby Lambert, the adult and circulation services supervisor, and Amadee Ricketts, who is the children and teen services supervisor. In addition to working with these three women, I may work with other librarians depending on what is involved in the process of organizing the competition. Timeline:

Week two: begin preparations for the contest: gathering materials, working out details, planning out advertisements. Continue to help out around the library wherever I may be needed and learn more about the library system

Week three: Continue preparations for the library contest and start distributing advertisements in whatever form they may take. Make plans for the finishing touches and if there is more to be done after the internship, work out a system in which those details may be completed.
